UC Berkeley teams up with Nokia for traffic

BERKELEY, CA (KGO) -- Your GPS enabled cellphone could soon help you stay out of traffic jams. Nokia and UC Berkeley are teaming up for a pilot project that will allow your cellphone to receive real-time traffic information, and it's all free.

New software will tell you if there is a problem on your route and what you can do to avoid it, it will even give you an audio alert. It works using signals from GPS devices on phones that are in traffic. UC Berkeley and Nokia official said that your privacy will be protected:

"We collect as little information as possible and we get rid of privacy invasive information every step of the way. So that means your phone never sends information that reveals who you are. We strip away all the billing information, and all of the personally identifiable information," said Dan Work, U.C. Berkeley graduate student.
